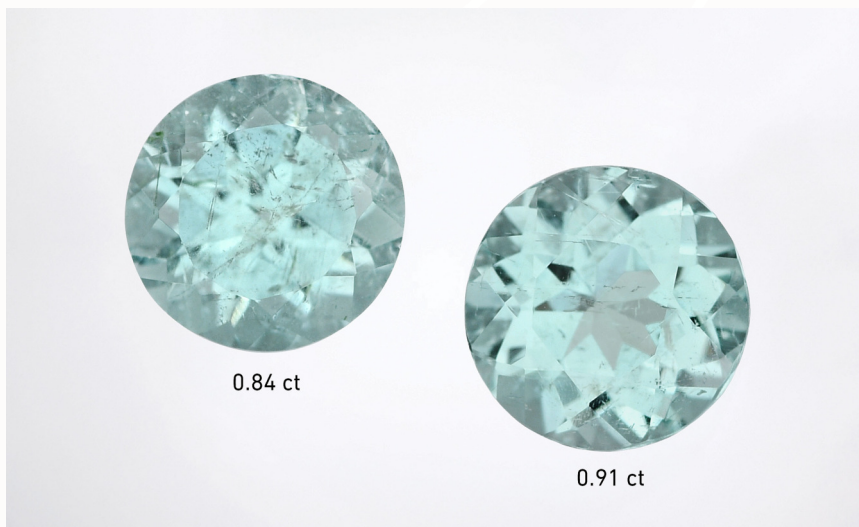

Tourmaline

Tourmaline comes in every color of the rainbow and can even have multiple colors in the same stone, such as "watermelon" tourmaline, displaying pink on the inside and green on the outside. Tourmaline's name comes from the Sinhalese word *tōrmalli*, which translates to "stone with mixed colors." Significant sources of tourmaline include Brazil, Namibia, Nigeria, Mozambique, and the United States.
